The Bob Evans restaurant group wanted to be sure it was an interactive farm experience. They have a test kitchen, garden, 1 mile walking path, and plenty of cooler space. The LEEDS building is 23% better in their operational costs. They also are concentrating on healthy activities for their employees.

June 20, 2016 -- Bob Lentz Habitat for Humanity

One of the service projects the club is considering supporting is the Habitat for Humanity site in Whitehall. At the June 20, 2016 meeting Bob Lentz with habitat presented a program about the mid Ohio chapter which covers Franklin, Licking, and Union Counties. Habitat for Humanity was started in Georgia in 1969 and is a faith-based program. The Columbus chapter was not started until 1978 and since that time they've helped over 350 families. There are 8 local churches in the Worthington area who help financially and with volunteers. The Worthington chapter partners

with Dublin, Beechwold and Clintonville for support volunteers. People getting a house have to devote sweat equity, attend a Dave Ramsey course and are required to take a home maintenance course.

The house is not free. The cost is up to 27% of their income and is at a 0% interest rate. The note is held by Habitat for Humanity. The house is appraised in order to base the mortgage value.

We can help on Tuesdays Thursdays and Saturdays between 9:00 and 3:30 and the location is 741 Erickson Ave. in Columbus, Ohio.

Examples are zoo adventures and amusement park adventures. They also enjoy outings with various sporting groups such as the Columbus Crew, Ohio State basketball and football and the Blue Jackets.
